
Our young scientists closely observed their experiment, thoughtfully analysed the results and drew their conclusions. Learning Outcome 4: Children

Taking Care of our Families

Over the past week I have had a number of conversations with concerned parents regarding road use, scooters, bikes and our school crossing. I am taking this opportunity to remind everyone that the care and safety of our students and their families is everybody's responsibility. School crossing speed is 25 km an hour, slowing down leading up to and beyond the crossing is essential. Please observe these rules in order to keep our children safe. It is also expected that students meeting parents on the other side of the road will cross at the crossing. Please encourage your children to do so and be patient as they take a few extra seconds. Finally, we have some students who are regularly riding scooters and bikes in the middle of the road near corners. Students have, this year, been informed by the RAA of safe ways to use roads and footpaths. Please encourage your children to use the footpath and to do it in a way that gives consideration to pedestrians. Where students must use the road to ride they should do so at the edge of the road and remain aware of drivers at all times. Your support in this matter of safety is much appreciated.


Year 6/7




The year 6/7 class have had a busy start to 2018!

The class particularly enjoyed a problem solving lesson called 'Briony's triangle'. In this lesson the students used a square piece of paper to make an origami flower. They were then asked to shade a tiny triangle, then a question was posed, 'What fraction is the tiny triangle of the whole square paper?' This was a great mental maths / hands on way at looking at fractions for students. It allowed them to create a flower and discuss their results with a partner. There was lots of puzzled faces, questions, folding and then unfolding.

Some of the students' response to solving this puzzle are below.





Briony's triangle

- 1. I stared by folding a square pieces of paper into triangle until it look like a flower.
- I unfolded it and discovered there were 16 squares I traced around all of them.
- 3. So then I traced around the 4 big triangles that was in each square
- 4. I divided the big triangles into little triangles and there was a little triangles in each big triangle.
- 5. I timed 4 times 8 because there was
 4 big tringles and 8 little ones and it
 equalled 32 so then I timed 32 times
 16 because there was 16 squares and
 32 little triangles all together and
 that equalled 512 and the answer
