
Reception Classes

This term both reception classes have worked together for their humanities and social sciences learning (HASS) with a focus on history. The students have been learning about artefacts. To assist with this learning we used a war memorial box from the national trust museum. The students did not just have fun exploring the artefacts, it really helped with their learning.















Moving from preschool to reception is a big step for children. We have arranged for children to spend time in each other's learning spaces each fortnight, giving an opportunity for children to experience learning in different settings. A strong message is that the learning doesn't change just because the room is different. Children can have different learning goals from their classmates and a flexible learning environment contributes to their success.

Your child's learning portfolio is a place for you to grab a pen and write comments about their learning. We will get better at letting you know when a new piece of documentation has been added.

The safety and wellbeing of our students is always an important consideration while your child is at school. We establish codes of conduct, protocols and policies with students, staff and parents to ensure this happens. Keeping your children safe and assisting them in making strong choices is a partnership between home and school, especially when it comes to staying safe online.

Your child's access to the internet at school is only through classroom tasks. Mobile phones are expected to be switched off and handed to classroom teachers. This is for safety reasons and protects your child from making weak choices online and from actions of others. We are not able to monitor your child's social media accounts but would expect that a responsible adult is doing that at home. While we can manage the fallout of cyberbullying if the consequences are spilling into school, the cyber bullying itself occurs outside of school and is often outside our control, and can become a police matter. Monitoring your child's online activity and social media use minimises many of these problems. We ask that you discuss this with your child, especially during the holiday time.
